"We think senior pets make perfect companions," said Dan Hanley, director of adoptions and customer service at Peninsula Humane Society & SPCA. "Age is just a number; our older cats and dogs have plenty of pep in their step and love in their hearts just for you."

Senior pets like Babe, Rocky and Crybaby often already have basic obedience skills and have been house trained and socialized with animals and people. It's far easier to assess an older pet's temperament than a wiggly puppy or kitten, so owners will have a better idea of what to expect.
