Peninsula Humane Society & SPCA Performs 10,000th Free Spay/Neuter Surgery on Mobile Clinic Today

Daly City, CA---The Peninsula Humane Society & SCPA (PHS/SPCA) performed their 10,000th free spay and neuter surgery on their mobile clinic this morning at the Pet Food Express parking lot in Daly City. The 10,000th animal was a male seven month old black cat named Shadow. The cat's owner Carlos Acre also received gift baskets from Pet Food Express and PHS/SPCA.

"Our mobile spay and neuter clinic has been offering families with limited financial means the ability to fix their pets for free since 2005," said PHS/SPCA's Communications Manager Buffy Martin Tarbox. "We are delighted to celebrate our 10,000th altering surgery, a major milestone not only for our organization, but for the communities we serve."

The mobile clinic provides free of charge spay or neuter surgeries on a first come first serve basis throughout several communities in San Mateo County and San Francisco almost on a weekly basis.

"Since this service is first come first serve, Carlos was in line at 6:00 am this morning to make sure his cat would be able to fixed today. He was surprised when he was informed that his cat Shadow was to be our 10,000th surgery," according to Tarbox.
