Peninsula Humane Society & SPCA waives adoption fees for all small animals

Burlingame, CA---The Peninsula Humane Society & SPCA (PHS/SPCA) is hosting a small animal adoption promotion inspired by the winter holidays. The promotion is called It's the Most Bund-erful Time of the Year and adoption fees are waived on all small animals which includes rabbits, guinea pigs, rats, hamsters and mice.

“There's a zero percent chance of snow this season in the San Francisco Bay Area, but if you're dreaming of a white Christmas, we suggest adopting one of our lovely solid white rabbits,” said PHS/SPCA's Communications Manager Buffy Martin Tarbox. “Rabbits have long been considered a symbol of good luck and fortune, so adding a rabbit to your house might increase your luck. Even if you don't believe in the rabbit superstition, you'll still have a delightfully fun pet by adopting a rabbit.”

Small animals can be the perfect pets for some people, especially those living in small places since they don't require as much room as other animals. They are often quieter animals as well with no barking or meowing to worry about.

“We've experienced a spike in the number of small animals coming into our shelter as strays and currently have more than 25 small animals available for adoption,” said Tarbox.

Adoptable small animals are available at PHS/SPCA Tom and Annette Lantos Center for Compassion, 1450 Rollins Road, Burlingame. The shelter is open for adoptions 11:00 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 11:00 a.m. to 5 p.m. on weekends. Potential adopters should arrive at least an hour before closing time to complete an adoption or call 650-340-7022 to schedule an appointment.
