Who is to blame for fallen tree?

Stanford is attempting to shift blame onto San Mateo County for a scarping tree that fell on a van and killed a driver on Alpine Road in Portola Valley. The university filed a claim against the county on March 11 alleging that a

county project around Stanford's property damaged the soil and destabilized a creek bank, causing a tree to fall on Juan Juan Cruz-Diaz, 29, of San Jose, during a storm in March 2023.

Stanford didn't get into specifics about the county's project, saying that lawyers would need to go through discovery first. "The impacts of the work ... con-

tributed to the failure and the incident itself," attorney Ashley Meyers said in the claim, which the Post obtained using the California Public Records Act. The county in 2017 approved a 16-mile path and stabilized a creek bank in three areas between Woodside Drive in

HOSTAGE TO BE FREED: Hamas said yesterday that the last living American hostage in Gaza, Eldar Alexander, will be released as part of efforts to establish a ceasefire, reopen crossings into the Israeli-occupied territory and resume the delivery of aid as President Trump plans to visit the Midwest later this week.

PROGRESS WITH CHINA: Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent said the U.S. has made "substantial progress" in the weekend negotiating sessions over tariffs on China, but he offered few details. Chinese Vice Premier He Lifeng said both sides had agreed to "establishing a consensus mechanism" for more talks.

AIR FORCE ONE: The Qatar government has shot down media reports that it is giving President Trump a luxury Boeing 747-8 jumbo jet as a gift. Qatar officials accused talks over the jet had taken place, but no offer has been made. Trump is frustrated that Boeing is late in delivering a new set of Air Force Ones.

Lucky ducklings rescued

A Midtown Palo Alto resident spotted four ducklings crossing Middlefield Road, corralled them into a carport and called Animal Control Officer Cody Macartney for help.

The rest of the family was nowhere to be found in a nearby creek, so Macartney brought the ducklings on April 22 to the Peninsula Humane Society's wildlife center in Sausalito, where they were fed duck crumble and fresh greens three times a day, spokeswoman Colleen Crowley said.

The ducklings were weighed and examined every day for a week. They swam in a pool and had good appetites, so they were brought to an animal sanctuary outside of Chico, where they'll grow up and be adopted, Crowley said.

3 more charged in fatal jail beating

Three more inmates have been charged in a fatal beating of a Mountain View man at a Santa Clara County jail, court records show. The attack was allegedly motivated by Norteño gang leaders, Detec-

tive David Carroll said in his police report. Cameras at the Elmerwood Jail in Milpitas picked up a meeting where the words "Sureno" and "he ain't be here," were said at 11:38 a.m. on Jan. 27, Carroll said. Oscar Usual Xicoy, 25, of Mountain

View, walked out of the showers at 11:45 a.m., and two inmates walked up to him and blocked him from walking down the aisle to his bunk bed, police said.

A third inmate joined them, and they pulled Usual Xicoy back into the show-

A Midtown Palo Alto resident spotted a group of ducklings crossing a street and corralled them with a net and called Palo Alto Animal Control Officer Cody.

The ducklings were taken to a temporary enclosure at the Midtown Animal Care Center, where they were housed until they could be released. The ducklings were brought to the Midtown Animal Care Center on April 22 to the Midtown Animal Care Society's duck crumby farm in Saratoga, where they were fed three times a day and housed in an enclosure.

The ducklings were weighed and given a bath each day for a week. They were then released to a pool and allowed to swim so they could be released to a natural sanctuary where they would be released, and
